

Who will benefit?

- Judges working on civil and criminal cases,
- Lawyers, citizens and public authorities can use this newly created register of European Experts as a reference source,
- Citizens who are parties to court cases,
- Companies and insurers,
- European citizens, researchers, journalists...

The aims

This project aims to enable judges, lawyers and citizens of the European Union to:

- learn more about the concept and procedure of judicial expertise in each Member State,
- identify the lists of Experts already drawn up by the Member State and the entities in charge of managing these lists,
- for civil, administrative and criminal proceedings, to find a suitable judicial Expert able to answer technical or scientific questions arising from the case concerned or to carry out the required technical tasks and give his opinion, both orally and in writing,
- to create a register of European Experts.

Expected Results

The project will facilitate the access to information on Expert proceedings and judicial Experts in the European Union and contribute to the enhancement of mutual trust in justice between the courts, lawyers and citizens of the EU Member States. For each Member State, the following results are expected.

- Concrete, transparent and reliable information on judicial expertise in each Member State for judges, lawyers, companies, legal bodies and citizens of the whole EU,
- Development of mutual trust between the courts and professionals about Expert proceedings in each Member State,
- Accelerate the consensus between Member States in order to create European judicial Expert lists as well as a European standard of Experts' further education and training of judicial Experts where there are none and, in doing so, improve the quality of judicial Expert proceedings in each Member State,
- Find convergence ways for categories of judicial Experts' specialties, with the final aim to create a harmonised nomenclature of specialties throughout Europe.

The main milestones of the project

September-December 2017

Preparation of a questionnaire by the Scientific Committee of the project led by Prof Gilles Cuniberti with Dr Christiane Lenz.

The questionnaire consisted of 72 multiple choice and open questions concerning the appointment of judicial Experts, lists of registered Experts, qualifications required to become a judicial Expert, legal obligations judicial Experts have to respect during court proceedings, the remuneration of Experts, Experts' liability, the use of Experts' opinions in trial as well as statistics and the designation of Experts in the different EU Member States.

June 2018

Start of the evaluation of the results of the survey.

January 2018

Implementation of the questionnaire into an Online tool.

At the end of March 2018

Dissemination to 512 contact persons.

April and May 2018

Preparation of a template for the information sheets on judicial Expert proceedings in every EU Member State to be published on the e-justice-website.

End of August 2019 Online publication of Expert lists

Link to existing judicial Expert lists (or, as the case may be for some Member State, Experts associations) and/or search tools. For each Member State, online publication of the information sheets mentioned above.

EEEI

- To improve the quality & independence of judicial Experts in the EU,
- To find areas of consensus to foster the harmonization of judicial Expert proceedings & judicial Expert status, ethics, training and evaluation across European Justice systems,
- To facilitate & build a European register of acknowledged Experts.

Approach

- Teamwork between European legal practitioners (judges, prosecutors, lawyers, Experts), academics, legal persons & citizens,
- Permanent activities: research work, mutual assistance network, document database on expertise, conferences, web site...
